Josephite Colloquium – A Journey of Connection and Faith

At the end of last month, Jess and I had the privilege of attending the Josephite Colloquium in Auckland — a three-day residential gathering that brought together leaders from Josephite schools across Aotearoa to reflect on the legacy of Saint Mary MacKillop and the Sisters of St Joseph.

Throughout the hui, we deepened our understanding of the Josephite charism and explored how it continues to shape the heart of our kura today. It was a powerful reminder that St Joseph's Pātea is part of a wider whānau, connected by a shared mission of service, compassion, and faith.

We gained valuable insights into how the Josephite values influence daily practices, prayer life, and our school's sense of

community. It was inspiring to see how the values we live out each day — courage, justice, and love for those most in need — are rooted in the lives of Mary MacKillop and Fr Julian Tenison Woods. We've returned with renewed purpose and a stronger connection to the Josephite network, excited to integrate these values more intentionally into our curriculum, liturgies, and the everyday life of our school.

We look forward to sharing what we've learned with our staff and tamariki, and to continuing this journey together as a faith-filled learning community.

The spirit of Mary MacKillop lives on in our acts of kindness, our commitment to equity, and in every moment we choose to put others first.

To Tātou Whakapono – Te Atua

Theme: "God is present in the world and in us on our spiritual journey."

This term, our tamariki are deepening their understanding of Te Atua (God) and learning how He is present with us always — within our wairua (spirit), throughout te taiao (the natural world), and along the path of our lives.

Framed through both Māori and Catholic worldviews, this learning helps students recognise the divine presence not only through Scripture and prayer, but also through their whakapapa — the sacred connections to our ancestors, to one another, and to all of creation.

As the stars of Puanga rise and mark the beginning of the new year in the Maramataka (Māori lunar calendar), we are entering a season of reflection. Tamariki are learning that this is a time to remember those who have passed, give thanks for what has been, and prepare for what lies ahead. We are using a range of practices — karakia (prayer), pūrākau (traditional stories), Biblical narratives, and quiet reflection — to support our learners in recognising God's aroha (love) in the everyday. Whether in the stillness of nature or the warmth of a kind gesture, they are discovering that God's presence is not confined to a building — it surrounds us and lives within us.

Through this integrated learning, our tamariki are being invited to walk in faith with open hearts, growing in their Māori identity and in their Catholic spirituality.

🖒 He Ara Mahi mā te Whānau – Ways to Support at Home:

- Kōrero with your tamaiti about where they feel the presence of Te Atua perhaps in the night sky, the rising of Puanga, or in the quiet of nature.
- Share your own stories of spiritual connection, whakapono (faith), or tikanga that honour the sacredness of life and creation.
- Say karakia together, giving thanks for the whenua, whānau, and all that God provides.
- Encourage acts of manaakitanga and aroha, reminding your child that when we show love, respect, and forgiveness, we reflect the heart of Jesus.

Let us walk this haerenga wairua (spiritual journey) together

— guided by Te Atua, grounded in our whakapapa, and inspired by the rising of Puanga.

This year's celebration is guided by the theme: Te Hongia o Puanga - Embracing the Spirit of the Season

"Hongia" refers to the hongi — the traditional greeting where we share breath, life force, and connection. In the context of Puanga, *Te Hongia o Puanga* invites us to greet the new season with open hearts, to embrace its arrival, and to connect with the life-giving essence it brings.

The word hongia also means "to smell" or "to inhale," which adds deeper meaning. Just as Turi, the ancestor of the Aotea waka, knew this was the right place to settle when he smelled the goodness of the land, we too are invited to "smell the goodness" of Puanga — the freshness of the season, the promise of growth, the abundance of kai, and the strength of community bonds.

As we gather, Te Hongia o Puanga reminds us to honour our local history, appreciate the gifts of the land, and move forward into the new season with hope, unity, and aroha.

Attendance Matters

Regular attendance is a key factor in your child's success at school. The Ministry of Education recommends that all students attend at least 90% of the time — that means no more than 5 days absent per term.

At St Joseph's School Pātea, we're working together to help our tamariki meet this goal. We know that consistent attendance builds strong learning habits, friendships, and a sense of belonging. We also understand that life happens. If your child is unwell, please keep them home to rest and recover — just remember to let us know the reason for their absence. Open communication helps us support your child and keep accurate records.

Attendance Tips for Whānau:

- Try to schedule appointments (like the dentist or doctor) outside of school hours when possible.
- Keep consistent routines at home bedtimes, morning habits, and packing bags the night before all help!
- Reach out to us early if there are any challenges with getting to school we're here to help.
- Celebrate milestones: when your child has a strong attendance streak, acknowledge their effort!
