
Praying the Rosary – October 2025

All Saints' Day – Friday 31 October 2025

As part of our reflection, we will also celebrate St Mary MacKillop, our school's patron, whose dedication to education and care for children continues to inspire us today. Students will learn about the lives of different saints and think about how they can follow their example in everyday life.

We encourage families to talk with children at home about people who inspire them through acts of kindness, courage, and service.

Attendance Matters

"Education is one of the best investments a country can make to alleviate poverty...

To ignite a passion in the earliest years means opening windows to the world." - Saint Mary MacKillop Highlights the importance of nurturing a love of learning from the earliest years, shaping bright futures for our students.

Regular attendance at school is important to your child's success and there is a clear connection between going to school regularly and doing well in the classroom. Making sure students attend and engage in learning is a shared responsibility. As a parent, you are responsible for making sure your child attends school every day. If your child is going to be absent for any reason it is essential that you let us know as soon as possible. It is important that you contact the school office via phone, email or a message to confirm the absence and provide us with the reason. You should contact your child's teacher in advance if you have a planned absence during school time.

A new initiative from the Ministry of Education this year is the Stepped Attendance Response process – STAR. The STAR sets expectations for school, student, parent/guardian, Ministry of Education and broader system responses to student absence. It provides a series of activities that should be considered when students meet absence thresholds. In summary:

- ✓ Less than 5 days absence in a school term = Good
- ✓ Up to 10 days absence in a school term = Worrying, contact parents to discuss reasons for absence
- ✓ Up to 15 days absence in a school term = Concerning, send escalated formal notification to parents and hold a meeting
- √ 15 days or more absence in a school term = Serious Concern, send warning notice, arrange meeting with parents and escalate to multi agency response

We acknowledge that there are genuine reasons students may occasionally be absent. However, without regular attendance your child will struggle to make progress. If your child's attendance falls below 85% this term, we will be in touch to check in and see if there is any support that the school could provide. If the attendance continues to fall, there will be an escalation in the response.

Health Alert – Measles in Taranaki

There is currently a confirmed measles case in Taranaki. To keep our tamariki safe, please check that your child's immunisations are up to date. If your child hasn't had the MMR vaccine, please contact your GP or local clinic as soon as possible.

If your child is feeling unwell or has symptoms such as fever, cough, runny nose, or a rash, please keep them at home until they are fully better. This helps protect all our students and staff.
